#### *Now* is the time for Peace with Justice!

The Colombian government and the largest Colombian guerrilla group (the FARC) are currently engaged in peace negotiations in Havana, Cuba. This will be a challenging process, but as people of faith and conscience, we are hopeful that these talks will produce an accord that will end over five decades of devastating civil war.

However, we must commit to working with the Colombian people so that civil society, including victims of displacement and other human rights violations, can meaningfully participate in crafting a true, sustainable peace that will be for all Colombians.

For over a decade, the U.S. government has promoted harmful trade policies, supported a toxic aerial spraying program, and given billions of dollars in mostly military aid to Colombia. These policies have deepened the armed conflict instead of reducing violence for the Colombian civilians caught in the middle of it. It's time for us to try something new, not just in Colombia, but in our relations with all of Latin America. Instead of giving priority to corporate and military interests, we must create policies that support land rights activists, Afro-descendant and indigenous communities, human rights defenders, and small-scale farmers who face threats and attacks every day just because they ask for the basic right to live on their lands in peace.

This April, tens of thousands of people will come together to advocate for peace in Colombia and for U.S. policies that will help end, rather than exacerbate, the Western Hemisphere's longest-running armed conflict.

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
