Confession (From HMC's Statement on Racial Justice)

As followers of Christ, we uphold that diversity is God's blessed design and that followers of Jesus are called to be changemakers for justice.

Inspire us. May we hear the words so clearly as the disciples did on the day of the Transfiguration.

We mourn our congregation's silent witness and complicity in racism in America. Too often we have failed to follow in the footsteps of Jesus and failed to walk in solidarity with Black, Brown, Indigenous, and other people of color who are marginalized.

Forgive us. Remind us all are created in the image of God, connected to one another's well-being.

We acknowledge that our predominantly white congregation has benefited from generations of slave and immigrant labor as well as policies and customs that prioritize and maintain the power of whiteness. These policies began with the displacement and erasure of Native populations, culture, and wildlife during European settlement of North America and extend from legal slavery to World War II internment and the criminalization of entire populations along ethnic lines and continue today through systemic racism and normalized bigotry.

Give us courage. May we desire transformation of our own hearts and practices.

Even as Hyattsville Mennonite Church holds dear the teaching of Jesus on peace and justice, we find our own history reverberates with historical injustice. During the 1950s, the church followed "white flight" from the District of Columbia, developing its first building just outside the city in a suburb with racial covenants and active segregationist policies. In recent decades, due to lack of relationships with those most affected outside our congregation, we have too often failed to challenge law enforcement and legal systems that imprison, deny citizenship, and provide unequal justice for poor and disenfranchised neighbors.

Grant us discomfort. May we shun the safety of indifference and privilege and choose to make our home among the vulnerable, living in solidarity with the criminalized and despised.

Congregational Response (From HMC's Statement on Racial Justice)

Worship Leader: You are a God of transformation and wholeness, of light shining in darkness.

Left: We celebrate the progress in civil and human rights that has been achieved through the sacrifice of many activists and common citizens.

Right: We rejoice in the cross-cultural relationships and values expressed in and through our congregation.

Worship Leader: You are a God of learning and unlearning, of action and stillness.

Left: We commit ourselves to action through listening, building relationships with and seeking out perspectives of persons of color from within and outside our congregation to inform our work for justice.

Right: We commit to lifelong self and community education around issues of implicit bias, systemic racism, and white supremacy.

Worship Leader: You are a God of justice, of healing when wrongs are righted, alive in relationships of solidarity.

Left: We commit to forming partnerships with churches and community-based organizations that represent historically marginalized communities to offer our financial support and advocacy.

Right: We commit to seeking reparations for harmed groups through various forms of political activism, protest, directing finances and voting to influence policymakers and legislators.

Left: We commit to following leadership from communities of color, to using our talents and resources to address local inequities in systems such as education, healthcare, employment, environmental justice, housing, and criminal justice.

All: May our lives encourage justice to roll on like a river, righteousness like a never-failing stream!
